

Do you have the correct "John Smith"? Ways to differentiate your Rev War Vet:

- Colony they served from
- Unit and commanding officers
- Birth date/place, Death date/place, Burial
- Marriage, spouses and children
- Census inventory
- Occupation before and after the war

The Revolutionary War

- April 19, 1775 War begins with shots fired at Lexington and Concord in Massachusetts.
- June 14, 1775 Continental Congress (13 Colonies) creates the Continental Army with George Washington as the commander.
- June 17, 1775 Battle of Bunker Hill first major conflict and first American win.

July 4, 1776 - Continental Congress adopts Declaration of Independence

December 1776 to January 1777 - Washington crosses the Delaware River and achieves victory at Trenton, New Jersey February 1778 - France enters war against Britain September to October, 1781 - British Army Surrenders September 3, 1783 - Treaty of Paris officially ends the war

Militia (~145,000 soldiers)

community based, irregular training

advanced regular training

Continental Army (~231,000 soldiers + ~12,000 French) professionally training

[British ~22,000 + Loyalists ~25,000 + Hessian ~ 30,000]

Identify Your Ancestors Who Served

Typically males born 1730 through 1770 are candidates. Search your genealogical database for men born in this timeframe (and living during the war).

Don't limit your search to direct ancestors. Brothers, cousins, uncles, nephews, in-laws may have served and their military records may include important family info.

Identify Your Ancestors Who Served

Any family legends concerning the Revolutionary War?

Any family relics that may be from the Revolutionary War era?

Bounty Lands

- Federal located in present-day Ohio
 - Usually required 3 years service in Continental Army
- State MA, ME, NY, PA, MD, VA, NC, SC, GA
- Ex: New York land was in present-day counties: Cayuga, Cortland, Onondaga, Seneca, Oswego, Schuyler, Tompkins, and Wayne







- Displays the patriot's lineage

Patriotic Service Description:

- 1. Private in Captain Abel Thayer's company, Colonel Fellows's (8th) regiment; company return dated Dorchester, October 1775
- 2. Captain Thomas Barns's (Light Infantry) company, Colonel Thomas Nixon's regiment; Continental Army pay accounts for service from 2 April 1777 to 31 December 1779
- 3. Captain William Toogood's company, Colonel Nixon's regiment; return of men in camp on or before 15 August 1777, dated Camp near Peeksk 16 February 1779; reported deserted 12 April 1778; returned 14 May 1778
- 4. Captain Barnes's company, Colonel Nixon's (6th) regiment; pay abstract made up from 17 May 1779, to 31 August 1779; reported returned fro captivity 17 May 1779
- 5. Prisoner of war
